Baton Roots

Community Farm Network

Baton Roots Community Farm is a network of urban agricultural hubs around the city of Baton Rouge. Whether at the main site at BREC Howell Park or the many satellite and mobile sites, Baton Roots provides a mix of urban agriculture training, conservation and permaculture practices, and the ability to bring fresh food home in areas of food deserts.

Baton Roots Mobile Garden Sites at East Baton Rouge Parish Housing Authority

For a second year, Baton Roots has partnered with East Baton Rouge Parish Housing Authority (EBRPHA), to continuing bringing Urban Agriculture to residents with the Mobile Farm program.

Throughout the year, 11 EBRPHA affordable housing complexes received either raised garden beds or in-ground farm rows to create a mini-Baton Roots community garden on site. These locations received a year of maintenance and urban ag training for residents.

The new Baton Roots effort is aimed at providing fresh produce and marketable skills to residents "that will last a lifetime," said J. Wesley Daniels, chief executive director of the housing authority. "It will truly be an intergenerational effort for our families," said Daniels.

"A portion of the main farm is also open to the public for harvesting," said Helena Williams, director of operations and communications for the Walls Project.

Baton Roots partnered with Baton Rouge Green to add 8 citrus orchards with 100 trees to Baton Roots community gardens at EBRPHA communities. Trees were planted by staff, volunteers, and community members in March-April 2023.

Baton Roots Hustle & Grow

Urban farmership through education is a critical component in the makeup of the Baton Roots vision. To reach youth, Baton Roots began its Hustle & Grow program in 2019. In its third year, Hustle & Grow has been integrated into three high schools: Glen Oaks High School, Capitol High School, and Scotlandville High School.

Youth enrolled in the Hustle & Grow program learn from Baton Roots staff how to farm in an urban setting, right on their school grounds! As always, students can take home any produce to share with their families, while additional produce is distributed to schools or at

community events.

During the summer, Hustle & Grow continued with **Mayor-President Sharon Weston-Broome's Mayor's Youth Workforce Experience (MYWE)**. Held at Baton Roots' main site at BREC Howll park, teens participated in an 8-week paid summer program provided in partnership with Big Buddy Program. The career preparedness program leads young people through four identified pillars: mentor support, training and enrichment, civic responsibility, and social-emotional learning (SEL) skills.

Baton Roots Community Farm at BREC Howell Park

Sow Good Saturdays

Sow Good Saturday, a monthly partnership event with Geaux Get Healthy and the American Heart Association, helps blend activities around health, nutrition, and growing fresh produce into a Saturday morning event. Here residents can experience yoga class, get a tasty treat from Chef Traci Vincent, and go home with bags of freshly picked produce.

Outside of Sow Good Saturday, Baton Roots has hosted groups like Rotary Club, Big Buddy, City Year, Key Clubs and Beta Clubs, Sprouts, The Council on Aging, graduates, families of the Hustle & Grow Urban Ag program, graduates and families of the Geaux Get Healthy Community Wellness Classes, and more. Additionally, this year Baton Roots has launched the beginning of a bokashi compost program for better conservation practices.

In partnership with BREC and National Endowment of the Arts, Baton Roots has constructed a utility yard designed to accommodate storage for farm equipment, a wash/pack station for the preparation of produce for distribution, and a hoop house dedicated to seedling production. This utility yard is more than just functional, it was painted with a mural of fresh fruits, vegetables, and Louisiana's animals to make it a major highlight of the farm.

Tech & Digital Skills Training

Hack-A-Thon

On March 11th, Baton Rouge teens had a unique Saturday, gaining skills for the upcoming Hack-A-Thon at JOLTcon on April 22nd. At Southern University's T.T. Allain School of Business, The Futures Fund instructors introduced vital skills to prepare for the competition. The workshops aimed to acquaint youth with tech, app development, and future workforce readiness, with applicability to new brands and businesses. Over 50 eager minds absorbed these skills for their concepts and the competition. Attendees expressed aspirations of future entrepreneurship. The Hack-A-Thon will focus on teens designing app solutions for better friend communication or merging social media and music discovery, vying for a grand prize.

JOLTcon

Teens' innate enthusiasm for futuristic innovations often lacks clear pathways for engagement in technology development. Initiatives like the Futures Fund, however, are narrowing this gap, enabling youth in the Greater Baton Rouge area and beyond to access creative arts and technology.

JOLTcon recently hosted a dual-part teen conference: a Hack-A-Thon competition and technology workshops. The Hack-A-Thon marked Baton Rouge's inaugural youth-centered app development contest, with teams of 1-5 creating apps to enhance teen communication or fuse music with social media. Among five competing groups, AME and FiveLanguagesinOne stood out.

AME clinched the \$500 cash prize for its well-designed interface and features. Workshop attendees had a chance to win a laptop and printer combo. The workshops, covering cybersecurity, UI/UX, AI ethics, and more, offered a holistic view of technology's diverse facets.

Coding Boot Camp

Coding Boot Camp (CBC) held its 9th and 10th Capstone Event this year where trainees presented their captivating projects. Trainees in the beginner and intermediate levels created websites over the course of several weeks after receiving instruction from instructors in the industry. They independently executed the planning, design, and development stages of the software development life cycle and presented the

final results as an elevator pitch. Trainees in the advanced level worked as a team to create a full website for an imagined entertainment company in addition to each building their own interactive JavaScript feature.

Throughout the semester, we heard community leaders speak on the following topics: Resume Building, Interviewing Tips for the Tech Industry, Certifications for Your Career, Financial Literacy and Building Generational Wealth, and general Inspiration and Motivation. 21 virtual sessions were held, 86% attendance rate, 69% retention rate, 3 trainees completed the full 3-level course.



FY2023 Financials

July 1, 2022 - June 30, 2023

The Walls Project expanded its programs throughout 2022-2023. Our model returned back to in-person events as finally the impact of COVID had officially subsided. To achieve this, we relied heavily on government, foundation, and corporate grant funding. In the future, greater efforts will be placed on engaging individual donors to help ensure a better mix of revenue sources.
